Type of School

St. Mary's is a Roman Catholic, four year, co-educational, comprehensive high school. It is fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and by the Western Catholic Education Association.

Location

The school is located on North El Dorado Street, one mile east of San Joaquin Delta College and two miles north of the University of the Pacific.

Campus

Located on twenty-five acres are four classroom buildings, the former administration building, computer and technology classrooms, cafeteria, two gyms, football field, track facilities, baseball and soccer fields, six tennis courts and athletic facilities including a weight room. Completed in the Fall of 2006 and now fully occupied is the Lagorio Family Academic Building. This addition to the campus houses the Van Ruiten Family Library, the Capurro Technology Center, administrative offices and five state of the art "smart" classrooms. Wireless Internet is available throughout the campus. In 2007 the Cortopassi Aquatics Center opened. There is a student chapel and a residence for the Oblates of St. Francis de Sales priests and brothers.

Size

Current enrollment is 983 students. 57% of the total student body represent Black, Hispanic, Asian, and American Indian minority groups. The faculty consists of 4 Religious (Priests, Brothers, and Sisters), and 100 lay teachers and support staff. Student/Faculty ratio is 17/1.

Curriculum

There are nine departments at St. Mary's from which students choose their required and elective courses: Religion, English, Social Studies, Mathematics, Physical Education & Health, Science, Computer, Foreign Language, and Fine Arts. Some courses are offered on three levels: remedial, college preparatory, and honors/AP.

Grading

The school year is divided into Fall and Spring Semesters. St. Mary's uses PowerSchool, a web-based information system which enables St. Mary's parents to access student academic and attendance records daily.

Co-curricular Activities

St. Mary's students are active in many clubs and organizations emphasizing creativity, leadership, scholarship, and service. Student athletes compete in the *Tri-City Athletic League* in badminton, baseball, basketball, cross-country, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming/diving, tennis, track, volleyball, water-polo, and wrestling.

Graduates

99% of the Class of 2011 were accepted at the following colleges and universities and earned awards and scholarships totaling over \$13,418,245. 66% were accepted at 4 year colleges and 34% were accepted at 2 year colleges.
